KidTalk Individual Therapy in St. Louis and three Outreach sites and KidStart Headstart Individual Therapy — Each child receives one-on-one 30-minute therapy sessions with a Master-level therapist. The twice a week sessions are tailored to each child's particular needs.

KidScreen Program — Children receive an initial 30-45 minute screening session to determine if they have any speech or language delays or issues. Screenings are done in the clinic locations as well as at local daycares and preschools.

KidTalk Prep Group Therapy — Groups of four children, ages 2-3, who are speaking very little or not at all, are seen in a small group format. This allows them to learn to socialize with their peers as their speech and language skills are stimulated. Children then generally go on to Individual Therapy as well.

All Ears Program — Children enrolled in Individual Therapy receive a hearing test by a licensed and certified audiologist. Hearing issues often accompany speech and language disorders. 89 children were evaluated in 2009

It Takes Two to Talk[®] The Hanen Program[®] for Parents – Parents desiring to learn assistance techniques for their children with speech and language disorders had a new option in this training program offered for the first time by the Clinic. Five families enrolled in the multi-session program during 2009 and results were very positive.

Volunteer Support

The Clinic is fortunate to have a strong core of highly talented volunteers to help meet our workload and leadership demands. There are groups and individuals that work on our special events, help in the office, serve on committees and help to lead the agency. We continue our partnership with Fontbonne University and St. Louis University (SLU) by providing their speech and language students with practicum hours. His mother noted, "Originally, it was hard for Jack to interact in any social setting. His receptive abilities were great, but he just couldn't communicate and he was very frustrated. 
