



Clinic History

The Walker Scottish Rite Clinic for Childhood Language Disorders is a 501(c)(3) charity organization and was founded in 1988 by St. Louis Scottish Rite Masons. The Clinic is one of 180 RiteCare® clinics around the country; each clinic operates independently.

Originally known as the Aphasia Clinic, that name was soon changed to the Scottish Rite Clinic for Childhood Language Disorders to more accurately reflect the children served. The Clinic is governed by a local fifteen-member board of directors. In its 23 years of providing speech and language services to children ages two through six years old, all services have remained free and more than 15,000 children have been served.



Clinic Services

The Walker Scottish Rite Clinic provides free services to children ages two through six years with communication disorders. The goal of the Clinic is to reach children who do not receive the help they need elsewhere. Each child enrolled in therapy receives sessions with one of the Clinic's seven Masters-level speech and language pathologists who are certified by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) and the Hanen Centre as well as being licensed by the Missouri State Board of Healing Arts. Therapy sessions are tailored to meet each child's particular needs. Services are provided at three locations in the greater St. Louis area, including the main site on Olive Street and two St. Louis City Head Starts, as well as three outlying sites in Crystal City, Elsberry and Union. The Clinic also focuses on community screenings at area daycares and preschools as well as coordinated outreach events. An additional focus is on parent education - giving the parents the tools they need to support their child's needs.

KidTalk Individual Therapy

Children, ages two through six, enrolled in the KidTalk program receive individual therapy (available in both English and Spanish) tailored to meet their specific speech-language needs twice weekly for an average of 12 to 18 months.

Children Served in 2011 = 92

Aidan had a lot to say, but no one could understand him. Aidan was originally diagnosed with Childhood Apraxia of Speech when he was just 20 months old. At age three, Aidan began to



attend the Clinic in the KidTalk Individual Therapy program. The initial focus was on teaching Aidan to make one specific sound and then later, to blend sounds together. First this was done in single words, then in short phrases, and finally in sentences.

KidTalk Outreach

The KidTalk Outreach program offers individual therapy to two- to six-year-old children in Elsberry (four days a week), Crystal City (two days a week) and Union (one day a week).

Children served at each Outreach

Location:

Elsberry = 29

Crystal City = 14

Union = 10

Total in 2011 = 53

Ruthie began therapy at the Union Outreach at two and a half years old. Her speech was comprised of mostly vowel sounds and few, if any consonant sounds. Remarkably, Ruthie's expressive language (vocabulary and sentence length) was considered normal; she was just extremely difficult to understand. As therapy progressed, Ruthie began putting endings on her words and began to produce various speech sounds in words.



KidTalk Prep Group Therapy

Groups of four children, ages two through three, who are speaking very little or not at all, are seen during an eight or 12 week session. The small group format allows them to learn to socialize with their peers as their speech and language skills are stimulated. Children then may go on to receive individual therapy as well.

A music therapist along with a music therapy student from Maryville University participate in KidTalk Prep's circle time where the music therapists use guitars, instruments and singing to help increase language and social communication skills of the children in the group.

Children Served in Group Therapy in 2011 = 12*

Amara first came to the Clinic when she was two years old. She understood speech but did not talk, instead used gestures and pointing to communicate. When she was not understood, she was frustrated. Amara began in the KidTalk Prep Group Therapy with three other children her age. In that program, she finally began to 'use her words' and was even combining some into short sentences.





KidScreen

Children at St. Louis area daycares/preschools receive speech-language screenings to identify potential problems through the KidScreen program. KidScreen takes place twice a year. Children receive an initial 30-45 minute screening session. The Clinic partners with Fontbonne University and Saint Louis University (SLU) by providing speech and language students with practicum hours as they help the Clinic's speech and language pathologists with annual screenings. Screenings are also conducted at the St. Louis Clinic as well as the Outreach and Headstart locations.

KidStart

Children at South Grand Grace Hill Head Start and Magnolia Head Start receive therapy from two speech and language pathologists two days a week. Therapy at the South Grand Head Start is conducted exclusively in Spanish.

KidStart Children Served in 2011 = 25

When Juan was four years old he talked in sentences but no one could understand him. Juan had velopharyngeal dysfunction. He could not move the muscles of his soft palate and throat well enough to close off air from escaping through his nose. He had hypernasality and nasal emission of sounds. Sister Margaret Guzzardo, a Clinic speech-language pathologist, was the first to evaluate Juan for communication at Grace Hill Head Start. She noted his abnormal speech, recognized the severity of it and advised Juan's parents to seek a medical diagnosis. Sister Margaret helped the family to navigate the maze of doctor visits, surgery preparation, and recuperation, Juan then began receiving speech therapy in Spanish at the Clinic.



All Ears


Each child that enters into individual therapy at the Clinic receives an audiological exam from Gayle Santucci, Ph.D., CCC-A and board-certified audiologist. Gayle works with the Clinic on a contract basis as part of her private practice. Middle ear problems, including ear infections or fluid behind the eardrum, will cause hearing loss and can inhibit speech and language skills. After the initial exam, children receive follow-up exams periodically while enrolled in therapy at the Clinic.


Clinic 2011 Finances and Budgets
